This past week I had the pure pleasure of watching 250 students grades 4-7 enjoy an amazing one-man performance of Jack London's classic tale <u>Call of the Wild</u>. The young people sat in rapt attention as actor Noel Gaulin physically and emotionally inhabited every role. The story is told from the perspective of Buck, a St. Bernard-Scotch Shepherd mix, who is stolen from his home in California and forced into work as a sled dog in Alaska during the Gold Rush. Noel's convincing performance included Buck's barks, whines, and howls, and those of the dogs and wolves he encounters. When the lights went up so did hundreds of hands with questions such as "How long did take to learn to act and sound like a dog?", and "Why did he write the book from a dog's perspective?" It was so rewarding to see and hear the enthusiasm in their voices as they shared their favorite parts of the performance.

Our next Youth in Arts performance is <u>Warriors</u>, an original, one-woman play that dramatizes Melba Patillo Beals' searing memoir about the battle to integrate Little Rock's central high school. Seen through the lens of a contemporary young activist, the performance asks, what does a warrior look like? What's worth fighting for? We are thrilled that the entire Woodstock Union High School and Middle School will attend the performance as part of their Martin Luther King Day programs.
